On May 14th, Concerned Citizens of Montauk held a press conference announcing our partnership with Dr. Christopher Gobler of Stony Brook University on an intense harmful algal bloom (HAB) monitoring program to be conducted in Fort Pond.

While most algae are harmless and often play an integral part in any aquatic ecosystem, some, like the blue-green algae (cyanobacteria), which was detected in Fort Pond during the summers of 2015 and 2017, produce toxins that can be harmful to humans and animals. In fact, the swimming portion of the 2017 Mightyman Montauk Triathlon was canceled due to the presence of a severe and toxic bloom.

Previously, sampling of the cyanobacteria blooms in Fort Pond had been sporadic and infrequent, with only a handful of samples taken. As of May, CCOM and the Gobler Lab will collect and analyze samples on a weekly basis. Every week, CCOM will inform the press and the public of the results via press release and on CCOM's Facebook page. Results will also be

posted to the NYS DEC's HAB Notification webpage. Dr. Gobler's results will be analyzed by the NYS Dept. of Health and Suffolk County Dept. of Health Services to determine if and when health or swimming advisories should be issued.

Harmful algal blooms are typically fueled by increased nutrient loadings from septic systems and stormwater runoff. Mitigating direct discharges of stormwater and replacing outdated and ineffective cesspools and septic systems with new innovative alternative systems, which have higher nitrogen treatment capabilities, can help remedy the problem.

CCOM believes that we must do a better job at understanding the blooms, their frequency, and their length; educating the community about the threats, and ultimately fixing the problem.

CCOM AWARDED LONG ISLAND COMMUNITY FOUNDATION GRANT FOR WATER QUALITY PROGRAMMING

CCOM is delighted to announce that we have been awarded a \$20,000 grant from the Long Island Community Foundation (LICF) to help fund our work to improve Montauk's water quality. This is the second LICF grant award CCOM has received in two years!

We are thrilled to continue our partnership with the Long Island Community
Foundation. LICF's funding helps make all that we do to protect Montauk's environment
possible. From our Save the Lake - Save the Pond educational initiative, to our latest
partnerships to test and monitor for harmful pollutants and algal blooms in Fort Pond and
Lake Montauk, this grant makes a huge difference

Last year's LICF \$20,000 grant award helped to advance CCOM's Save the Lake - Save the Pond initiative, which engages local property owners in a coordinated effort to reduce the human causes of Montauk's water pollution. In 2017 alone, CCOM facilitated 170 septic system inspections and pumpouts.

The biggest part of our Save the Lake program is to get people to understand that everything they do on their properties has an effect - whether immediate or long-term - on our waters. This year CCOM will continue to encourage all Montauk residents and business owners who haven't gotten their septics pumped in the last three years to do so, and to begin the process of upgrading their systems using the Town and County incentives, as well as visiting our newly redesigned website to sign our Clean Water Steward Pledge.
