SUPERSTORM SANDY, 8 YEARS LATER MONTAUK'S COASTAL FUTURE NEEDS YOUR VOICE

Following the devastation caused by Superstorm Sandy here in Montauk, since October 2012 CCOM has been leading the charge to help develop sustainable coastal resiliency planning. This includes facilitating NYS funding for scientific coastal assessment in Montauk and participation with key experts and East Hampton Town in the Coastal Adaptation and Resiliency Planning (CARP) committee working to establish long range coastal options for Montauk.

NOVEMBER ELECTION ENVIRONMENTAL PROPOSAL ON THE BALLOT

Whether you're voting early or on Election Day or right now by absentee, it is important to understand the Suffolk county ballot before you cast your vote.

Proposal Two on the ballot, if approved, would allow funds to be taken from the County's sewer stabilization fund, a fund created to help offset the costs in sewered or potentially sewered areas and minimize increases in sewer fees. These funds, originally meant to help protect water quality, would be transferred to the general fund to help offset anticipated budget shortfalls.

As we embark on planning for new innovative wastewater management options for downtown Montauk, including sewering, this could impact potential funding.

Suffolk County has been a leader in environmental protection and innovative water quality initiatives. A move like this could not only be harmful to the environmental health of Suffolk County, but also to public and economic health.

CCOM MONTHLY WEBINAR SERIES SAVING OUR WATERS FROM HARMFUL ALGAL BLOOMS

Worried about the toxic effect that harmful algae blooms can have in our local Montauk waters?

Please join us next month on Thursday November 12th at 4pm to hear from CCOM's water quality testing team and Dr. Chris Gobler of the Gobler Laboratory at Stony Brook Southampton, a world leader in the understanding and testing of harmful algae blooms.

These algae have a myriad of negative effects: fish kills, low-oxygen "dead zones," and respiratory and intestinal illness in humans and animals, and the Gobler lab tests CCOM's Fort Pond and Big Reed Pond samples for the presence of HABs.



systems and cesspools in the ground is an obvious plus but additionally, undisturbed wetlands naturally filter out pollutants and excess nutrients, help to recharge our water supply, and offer storm and flood mitigation.

* Habitat fragmentation is a major problem for local wildlife, and open spaces help these species and the greater ecosystem flourish.

* Equal access to outdoor recreation spaces is important for the physical and mental health of all of us but connecting with nature is also essential to inspiring our children to become the next generation of conservation leaders.

CCOM HISTORY SNAPSHOT SHADMOOR STATE PARK + CAROL MORRISON PARK






October is a great month to get outside and safely enjoy Montauk's beautiful natural beauty. And this October, while CCOM is celebrating its 50th anniversary, we are reminded of some of our past October efforts which have forever changed the Montauk landscape for the better.

In October 2000, after many years of dedicated advocacy led by CCOM and others, Montauk's 99 acre Shadmoor State Park was created, ensuring the perpetual protection of and public access to this beautiful, unique place. Check out the photos from our archive – a 1999 protest advocating to "SAVE SHADMOOR" led by Bill Akin, who remains active on our Board.

And then, ten years later in 2010, CCOM, Third House Nature Center and local citizens challenged the public sale of Montauk's Fort Pond House in NYS Supreme Court in what became a successful effort to save Fort Pond House for the community. With funding provided by the Town of East Hampton, community contributions and CCOM volunteers, the 4-acre property was renovated and opened to the public in 2016 and named Carol Morrison Park in honor of our first president. This is now a delightful peaceful public space on the shore of Fort Pond that can be used and appreciated by all.
